# Prelude

# Welcome

Though the word *trinity* is not found in the scriptures, today's second reading includes the apostolic greeting that begins the liturgy: The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all. In the gospel Jesus sends his disciples forth to baptize in the name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit. More than a doctrine, the Trinity expresses the heart of our faith: we have experienced the God of creation made known in Jesus Christ and with us always through the Holy Spirit. We celebrate the mystery of the Holy Trinity in word and sacrament, as we profess the creed, and as we are sent into the world to bear witness to our faith.



# **Remembering Baptism~Confession and Forgiveness**

All may make the sign of the cross +, the sign that is marked at baptism.

Blessed be the holy Trinity,  $\pm$  one God, who forgives all our sin, whose mercy endures forever. **Amen.** 

Let us confess our sin in the presence of God and of one another. *Silence is kept for reflection.* 

Most merciful God,

we confess that we are captive to sin and cannot free ourselves. We have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. For the sake of your Son, Jesus Christ, have mercy on us. Forgive us, renew us, and lead us, so that we may delight in your will and walk in your ways, to the glory of your holy name. Amen.

God, who is rich in mercy, loved us even when we were dead in sin, and made us alive together with Christ. By grace you have been saved. In the name of + Jesus Christ, your sins are forgiven. Almighty God strengthen you with power through the Holy Spirit, that Christ may live in your hearts through faith. **Amen.**

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# Greeting

# Prayer of the Day

Even though we are distant from one another, the Spirit unites us as we pray this ancient prayer that introduces the biblical readings for today.

Let us pray.

*After a brief silence for personal prayer, the presiding minister continues:* 

God of heaven and earth, before the foundation of the universe and the beginning of time you are the triune God: Author of creation, eternal Word of salvation, lifegiving Spirit of wisdom. Guide us to all truth by your Spirit, that we may proclaim all that Christ has revealed and rejoice in the glory he shares with us. Glory and praise to you, Holy Trinity, one God, now and forever. **Amen.** 

# WORD

God speaks to us in scriptures read, sung and preached.

# **First Reading**

Genesis 1:1--2:4a

At the beginning of time, God the Creator, God the powerful Word, and God the life-giving Spirit form the earth and all its inhabitants. God sees that all this created work is good and then rests on the seventh day.

# The Story of Creation

<sup>1</sup> In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. <sup>2</sup> The earth was barren, with no form of life; it was under a roaring ocean covered with darkness. But the Spirit of God was moving over the water.

# The First Day

<sup>3</sup> God said, "I command light to shine!" And light started shining. <sup>4</sup> God looked at the light and saw that it was good. God separated light from darkness <sup>5</sup> and named the light "Day" and the darkness "Night." Evening came and then morning—that was the first day.

# The Second Day

<sup>6</sup> God said, "I command a dome to separate the water above it from the water below it." <sup>7</sup> And that's what happened. God made the dome <sup>8</sup> and named it "Sky." Evening came and then morning—that was the second day.

# The Third Day

<sup>9</sup> God said, "I command the water under the sky to come together in one place, so there will be dry ground." And that's what happened. <sup>10</sup> God named the dry ground "Land," and God named the water "Ocean." God looked at what God had done and saw that it was good. <sup>11</sup> God said, "I command the earth to produce all kinds of plants, including fruit trees and grain." And that's what happened. <sup>12</sup> The earth produced all kinds of vegetation. God looked at what God had done, and it was good. <sup>13</sup> Evening came and then morning—that was the third day.

# The Fourth Day

<sup>14</sup> God said, "I command lights to appear in the sky and to separate day from night and to show the time for seasons, special days, and years. <sup>15</sup> I command them to shine on the earth." And that's what happened. <sup>16</sup> God made two powerful lights, the brighter one to rule the day and the other to rule the night. God also made the stars. <sup>17</sup> Then God put these lights in the sky to shine on the earth, <sup>18</sup> to rule day and night, and to separate light from

darkness. God looked at what God had done, and it was good. <sup>19</sup> Evening came and then morning—that was the fourth day.

# The Fifth Day

<sup>20</sup> God said, "I command the ocean to be full of living creatures, and I command birds to fly above the earth." <sup>21</sup> So God made the giant sea monsters and all the living creatures that swim in the ocean. God also made every kind of bird. God looked at what God had done, and it was good. <sup>22</sup> Then God gave the living creatures a blessing—and told the ocean creatures to live everywhere in the ocean and the birds to live everywhere on earth. <sup>23</sup> Evening came and then morning—that was the fifth day.

# The Sixth Day

<sup>24</sup> God said, "I command the earth to give life to all kinds of tame animals, wild animals, and reptiles." And that's what happened. <sup>25</sup> God made every one of them. Then God looked at what God had done, and it was good. <sup>26</sup> God said, "Now we will make humans, and they will be like us. We will let them rule the fish, the birds, and all other living creatures." <sup>27</sup> So God created humans to be like God's own self; God made men and women. <sup>28</sup> God gave them a blessing and said: Have a lot of children! Fill the earth and take charge. Be responsible for the fish in the ocean, the birds in the sky, and every animal on the earth. <sup>29</sup> I have provided all kinds of fruit and grain for you to eat. <sup>30</sup> And I have given the green plants as food for everything else that breathes. These will be food for animals, both wild and tame, and for birds. <sup>31</sup> God looked at what God had done. All of it was very good! Evening came and then morning—that was the sixth day.

<sup>2:1</sup> So the heavens and the earth and everything else were created.

# The Seventh Day

<sup>2</sup> By the seventh day God had finished the work, and so God rested. <sup>3</sup> God blessed the seventh day and made it special because on that day God rested from work.
<sup>4</sup> That's how God created the heavens and the earth.

Word of God, word of life. **Thanks be to God.** 

#### Psalm

Psalm 8 exemplifies the way that the Bible has been used in the development of Christian doctrine. Appropriate as a response to Genesis 1, the psalm praises God the creator, who is addressed as both YHWH, thus Lord, and Adonai, thus Lord or Master. The psalm states that human beings were created by God and given authority over creation. Because Hebrew was an androcentric language, human beings were spoken of in verse 4 as a single male, "man." This praise of a man was seen in the early church as a description of Jesus Christ and thus became important for trinitarian theology. Some current psalm translations are cast in nongender-specific plural, to make clear that the Hebrew meant "human beings." Contemporary Christians stress the responsibility of the care for creation that God has given to humankind.

Our LORD and Ruler,

your name is wonderful everywhere on earth!

Your glory is sung in the heavens above. <sup>2</sup> With praises from children and gurgling babes, you have built a fortress.

They make your enemies silent,

and all who turn against you are left speechless. <sup>3</sup> I often think of the heavens your fingers have made,

and of the moon and stars you put in place.

<sup>4</sup> Then I ask, "Why do you care about us humans?

Why are you concerned for us mortals?" <sup>5</sup> You made us a little lower than you yourself,

and you have crowned us with glory and honor.

<sup>6</sup> You let us rule everything your hands have made.

And you put all of it under our power-

<sup>7</sup> the sheep and the cattle, and every wild animal,

<sup>8</sup> the birds in the sky, the fish in the sea, and all ocean creatures.

9 Our LORD and Ruler,

your name is wonderful everywhere on earth!

#### Second Reading

2 Corinthians 13:11-13

Paul closes a challenging letter to the Corinthians with an appeal to Christian fellowship grounded in the triune harmony of Christ's grace, God's love, and the Spirit's partnership.

[Paul writes:] <sup>11</sup>Finally, brothers and sisters, farewell. Put things in order, listen to my appeal, agree with one another, live in peace; and the God of love and peace will be with you. <sup>12</sup>Greet one another with a holy kiss. All the saints greet you.

<sup>13</sup>The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with all of you.

Word of God, word of life. **Thanks be to God.**

# Creed

With the whole church, let us affirm our faith in God by saying the Apostles' Creed.
I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.
I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

ing. Amen.

We unite in prayer, asking God to send the Holy Spirit on the church, the world, and all who are in need. Today we will combine an ancient form of prayer called a Bidding Prayer, with a contemporary online technique called a Chatterfall. A chatterfall is when a group of people online use the online chat boxes to respond to a question all at the same time. Their responses cascade down the chat box like a waterfall.

So if you are following along online, here's how we'll combine a Bidding Prayer and Chatterfall. The assisting minister will invite you to pray about a one subject at a time, for example, "For the religious denominations and congregations we name before you now, we pray." Then the minister will pause silently. During the silence you can say the names of places that need God's Spirit. For those of you who want to use the Chatterfall, during the silence type the name of the place in the chat box—but wait to press enter until the minister says, "Hear us, O God." So during the silence, you could say or type "the Episcopal Church" or "Holy Trinity Lutheran Church." Then when the minister says, "Hear us, O God" you can press your enter key and all the places we typed will cascade like a prayer waterfall. We'll do that for each petition. Now let us prepare our minds and bodies for prayer.

# A brief silence.

God of community, you form us as your church. Guide church leaders, ministers, and all the baptized in sharing your life-giving good news with all the world. For the religious communities and leaders we name before you now, we pray: *A brief silence.* 

# Hear us, O God. Your mercy is great.

God of creation, you called everything into being. Sustain this world with your

renewing care. Inspire us to see waterways, plant life, birds, fish, insects, and mammals and call them good. For the earth, and the places and creatures we name before you now, we pray: A brief silence.

#### Hear us, O God. Your mercy is great.

God of counsel, all authority belongs to you. Encourage the leaders of this and every land to seek peace, equality, and unity. For the nations and communities we name before you now, we pray:

A brief silence.

Hear us, O God. Your mercy is great.

God of care, you created us in your image. Help us see your likeness in one another. Open our eves to see and attend to all who face oppression and suffering. Console, heal, and nourish all in need. For all those we name who need your Spirit of wholeness and life, we pray:

A brief silence.

Hear us, O God. Your mercy is great.

God of companionship, you accompany us in our households and friendship circles. As the rhythms of summer begin, renew all who will enjoy a time of sabbath, and shelter all who need your care. For the family members and friends near and far that we name before you now, we pray:

A brief silence.

Hear us, O God. Your mercy is great.

Hear also the cries of our own hearts. For our grief and joy, for our tears and laughter, for our fears and dreams, for ourselves, we pray

A brief silence.

Hear us, O God. Your mercy is great.

Receive these prayers, O God, and those too deep for words; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
